Examinations, Candidates and the Standard

Following the Easter examinations this year, I happened to hear, from the grapevine, that a candidate who failed one of our higher-level examinations has seen fit to question the competence of those who examined him and has, indeed, about describing individuals as fossils and dinosaurs. Whilst I am always cautious about hearsay statements and, indeed, sympathise with the individual for not achieving standards the required, I cannot help but feel that this reflects very badly on his own professional integrity. Further more, I regard his comments as clear evidence of a common failure to understand the requirements of our examinations.

Over the years there have been those who have claimed that the examination questions do not reflect what is happening in fencing today and that our educators and examiners are out of touch with 'modern fencing". It has to be said that these comments generally come from those who either fail the examinations or struggle so much with the standard required on the course that they then choose not to submit themselves for examination. These individuals simply fail to appreciate that our examinations are a test of both the key skills and knowledge required to teach and coach fencing.

THE COURSE OFFICER WHO?

Course Officer, Dave Jerry, writes:

As Course Officer, I am responsible for all the Academy courses. What can I offer to you?

Residential Courses

We are all familiar with the residential courses. Held each year at Easter and, this year for the first time, in the Autumn. The Summer course has moved to October because we are able to get exclusive use of the facilities at Denstone College. In the past we have always been sharing with other visitors to the site. How well the October date suits everybody, we will have to wait and see. Why Denstone? At Denstone they are able to offer the facilities that we require at a cost that is acceptable to the membership. What we need is:

25 or more beds, mixed age range and gender, single occupancy rooms, accommodation on Full Board basis,

Tea and coffee facilities at morning and afternoon breaks, use of a sports hall or gym roughly the size of 3 badminton courts or larger. So far Denstone can provide all these facilities at a price where you, the candidate, pay something in the region of £355. I am always on the lookout for other options that are easily accessible, so if you know of anywhere let me know.

Regional Courses

Both Academy News and our Web Site list the

courses that are being run in places all over the country. Over the last year we are getting the feeling that these courses are becoming less well subscribed. This may be for a number of reasons. For example, have we used up the Raw Material"? Have we trained all our coaches and have, therefore, achieved our aim - where is the new blood? Is the time taken to train on a typical one day per month course too long? Would you prefer full weekends and therefore qualify sooner?


If you want a course in your area it can be arranged for you. All we need are potential coaches with commitment, a venue and I will find the rest including a costing for you.

The other thing to bear in mind is that Level One is an assessed qualification. I am sure there are lots of fencers who have been guided in their clubs by more experienced coaches and who are helping in their clubs without qualification. I can help by putting you in touch with an

assessor who will be a Master, a Maître (weapon specific), a Provost or an Advanced coach (weapon specific and assisted by one other coach at level 3). All you have to do is ask.

Workshops

This year we have planned five "Tactics Workshops" at Frankley in the West Midlands. There has been favourable comment about these sessions, but they have been poorly attended. I need to know why. Are we in the wrong place, at the wrong time in a very busy fencing calendar, giving nothing to show for the day's work? In industry and in the professions, Continued Professional Development (CPD) is a requirement. Certificates are awarded which record what has been done. Would that be an incentive for Fencing Coaches?



Traditionally, we examination weekends a suitable time after the residential courses. The aim is to attract any candidates who may not have been successful at the end of the course to retake part or whole exams. I think that this is a valuable service, as it allows candidates to recover from what may have been a case

of exam nerves, after a very intensive week, to get back on track. These sessions are open to any fencer who wishes to try for a qualification not just ex-residential course members.

What I want from you

In the past, most feedback that I have received is positive, but we want to see more people taking advantage of the Academy's support. Please let me know if we are going wrong, or if we have got it right. Nothing is set in stone, we can change. Your views are worth their weight in gold and rest assured that if you have a suggestion, we will not rope you in to implement your idea. I understand that kind of reluctance - I frequently open my mouth and end up with a job. It will not happen to you.

Musings from your Members' Rep.

I finished my last article with something I picked up whilst listening to a lecture given by one of the coaches of the British Cycling team, which was basically that they tried to be a little better every day. This brings me nicely on to the theme of this article. What are we, as coaches doing to make ourselves better?

Criticising others, be they individuals or organizations, can be easy. There are plenty of examples of that sort of behaviour on the Fencing Forum. However being self critical can be difficult. Or at least being self critical, identifying an area for improvement, and then doing something about it can be difficult.

However I think that we can all try for continuous improvement in what we do, and that applies to everyone, from the most experienced fencing master to the most newly qualified level one coach. We can all review the lessons we give and think hard about ways that they could be better. We can all look at how we run our clubs, or structure our training sessions, and consider if perhaps our fencers would benefit from a slightly different approach.

If all of us coaches take time to consider what we do and try to improve ourselves, then fencing in this country will benefit. What we do to try and improve is up to us. It may be something as obvious as attending some regular coach education classes. That is, after all, what the Academy is there to provide. However, it does not have to be restricted to that.

This is something we can do as individuals - it doesn't take an initiative or programme from British Fencing or whomever, to happen. Such things can be welcome when they occur, but we do not have to place too much reliance of them. Ultimately we should all be responsible for our own personal development as coaches.

I know some of you do this sort of thing already. I can think of several notable examples of coaches who have gone to study abroad for a while, or gone to other clubs to learn from more experienced or more successful coaches.

So can I ask something of all of you between now and the next Academy News. First of all, can you think of something that you are going to do better between now and the end of the year? Secondly, can you then decide how you are going to do it? Thirdly, if you do have a good idea please can you send it in to Academy News so it can be shared with the rest of us. I'm sure Bob can be persuaded to find some space to publish the best ones (see Comment on page 7 - Ed.).

From Derek Evered

On reading Chris Beadling's article (Issue 50-Full Steam Ahead), I found myself totally in agreement. Premature fencing on the electric box inhibits full development of the basic strokes. This affects adversely both fencers and referees. With human judges, the referee (or President of a jury of judges) is forced to describe the fencing phrase. A referee's comment with electric scoring , "A hit for the left", when there are lights on both sides, does not inspire confidence in that referee's decisions.

There is a club in Otago, in the South Island of New Zealand, that practises only visual fencing rather than electric. No beginners and only French (straight) handles are allowed - no orthopaedic handles. This Salle Angelo was named after Maitre Domenico Angelo (1716-1802) fencing master at Eton College and his salle in London. His descendant Gio Angelo fences at this new Salle Angelo. As Professor Z.Czajkowski states in the same issue of Academy News, sound technique is essential for sound tactics, or, in his own words, "Tactics are closely connected with technique."

Finally I must point out an error. I have never been the <u>Chairman</u> at Egham Fencing Club and would not want to upset our long-serving Chairman (another Derek). However I have been coaching at that club for the past 32 years since it was founded.

BOOK REVIEW

UNDERSTANDING FENCING - The Unity of Theory and Practice, by Zbigniew Czajkowski 2005.

(SKA Swordplay Books: New York) Slimback 372 pp. £20 from Leon Paul, London. ISBN 0-9659468-8-6

(Editor's Note: In the last edition of Academy News, we were able to publish an article by Professor Czajkowski. This article is essentially a chapter of this book. Here, **Derek Evered** gives his review of the whole book.)



Arthur Conan Doyle, author of Sherlock Holmes, once wrote that to 'get up' a new subject, you should read a hundred books on it. I have read over a hundred books on fencing, duelling and the sword. This is the most thoughtful of them all.

Chapters of varying length include: Characteristics of Fencing, Terminology, Tactics, Timing, Motor Responses, Motivation and Arousal, Main Types of Fencer (the "Warrior" and the "Technician"), the Coach, Training the Athlete, Energy Abilities, Modern Concepts of the Individual Lesson, Just Before a Competition, and At the Competition.

The proof reading can be a bit indifferent, although the errors are not important. Some figures and tables are mis-numbered.

This text is written for coaches, or possibly those advanced competitors who read books on fencing (very few in my experience). He does not describe **HOW** to do the various moves and strokes, but we coaches know all that. So he is more concerned with **WHY** and **WHEN** to do them. I have already

included some of his multiple choice exercises in my own teaching.

It is pleasure to see the author's photograph on the front cover (above, left) clutching his foil and épée with their French (straight) handles, just like my own. Sadly most of the author's quoted publications on "szermierka" (fencing) are in their original Polish. It would be great if they could be translated into English or American and then re-published. It is an extraordinary achievement to write such a scholarly account in a language not his mother tongue. Every coach would gain something by reading this important monograph. Highly recommended.
